Re: Planning Application No: DC/25/0629 – Amended plans/information in relation to the construction of 206 dwellings, including the conversion of ‘Building 3’ and the demolition of ‘Building 36’ with associated works at Former Novartis Site, Parsonage Road, Horsham

Thank you for your letter/email dated 02 December 2025, regarding the above-mentioned consultation.

The proposed development amendments and the scheme as a whole have been examined from an aerodrome safeguarding perspective and could conflict with safeguarding criteria unless any planning permission granted is subject to the conditions detailed below:

Submission of a Bird Hazard Management Plan

Development shall not commence until a Bird Hazard Management Plan has been submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority. The submitted plan shall include details of:

- Management of the roofs of the apartment blocks and building 3 which may be attractive to nesting, roosting and “loafing” birds.

The Bird Hazard Management Plan shall be implemented as approved, upon completion of the roofs of the apartment blocks and alterations to the roof of building 3 and shall remain in force for the life of the buildings. No subsequent alterations to the plan are to take place unless first submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority.

Reason: It is necessary to manage the roofs in order to minimise its attractiveness to birds which could endanger the safe movement of aircraft and the operation of London Gatwick.

Please find a draft Bird Hazard Management Plan attached. If the applicants are in agreement, the methods of dispersal are to be completed where indicated in red and it needs to be signed and dated and submitted to yourselves pursuant to this condition.

Submission of Landscaping Scheme

No development shall take place until full details of soft landscaping works have been submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority. These details shall include:

- The species, number and spacing of trees and shrubs
- Details of any water features

No subsequent alterations to the approved landscaping scheme are to take place unless submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority. The scheme shall be implemented as approved.

Reason: To avoid endangering the safe movement of aircraft and the operation of London Gatwick through the attraction of birds and an increase in the bird hazard risk of the application site.

Submission of Details for PV Schemes

No solar panels shall be installed until full details have been submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority.

No subsequent alterations to the approved schemes are to take place unless submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority. The scheme shall be implemented as approved.

Reason: To ensure the development does not endanger the safe movement of aircraft or the operation of London Gatwick through interference with communication, navigation and surveillance equipment or glint and glare issues.

We will need to object to these proposals unless the above-mentioned conditions are applied to any planning permission. If you have any queries, please do not hesitate to contact me.

It is important that the conditions requested in this response are applied to a planning approval. Where a Local Planning Authority proposes to grant permission against the advice of London Gatwick or not to attach conditions which London Gatwick has advised, it shall notify London Gatwick and the Civil Aviation Authority as specified in the Town & Country Planning (Safeguarded Aerodromes, Technical Sites and Military Explosive Storage Areas) Direction 2002.

Bird Hazard Management Plan

Background

This management plan seeks to minimise the potential birdstrike risk to aircraft operating into and out of London Gatwick, which could arise from the construction of 206 dwellings including the conversion of building 3 with associated works at the Former Novartis Site, Parsonage Road, Horsham, approved under planning application number DC/25/0629.

Legislation

The management plan has been developed in response to concerns expressed by London Gatwick concerning the possible birdstrike hazard to aircraft and in the light of CAA (Civil Aviation Authority) 139/2014 'UK Acceptable Means of Compliance' and as contained in Circular 01/2003 – Safeguarding Aerodromes, Technical Sites & Military Explosives Storage Areas: The Town & Country Planning (Safeguarded Aerodromes & Military Explosives Storage Areas) Direction 2002.

This management plan has been agreed by the developer, Horsham District Council and London Gatwick as administrators of airport safeguarding matters for the airport.

It should be noted that this management plan is designed particularly for the situation at Former Novartis Site, Parsonage Road, Horsham and is not necessarily appropriate for other sites in the vicinity of Gatwick airport.

Extent of the Agreement

The parties identified above have agreed that the management plan set out below shall apply to Former Novartis Site, Parsonage Road, Horsham as detailed in planning application DC/25/0629. This will reduce the attractiveness of the proposed development to the target species.

This management plan identifies a number of measures which seek to control and reduce the potential birdstrike hazard, through the monitoring of the target bird species and any appropriate action taken.

Target Species

All Gull species.

Actions to be Taken:

- The roofs are constructed in such a manner so that all areas are safely accessible to enable any nests and eggs to be cleared and birds to be dispersed.
- Checks will be made weekly or sooner if bird activity dictates, during the breeding season by an appointed person/company. The breeding seasons for gulls typically runs from March to June.
- Any birds found nesting and/or roosting and/or loafing during the breeding season will be dispersed when detected and/or when requested by London Gatwick Airfield Operations staff.
- Any nests or eggs found will be removed. A CL12 licence must be obtained from Natural England before any removal takes place, please contact:

- Checks will be made on a regular basis, as dictated by bird activity, outside of the breeding season by a nominated person/company.
- Any birds found roosting and/or loafing outside of the breeding season will be dispersed when detected and/or when requested by London Gatwick Airfield Operations Staff.
- The methods of dispersal used will be as follows: ***(please list, for example human presence, distress calls).***
- A log will be kept which will detail the following:
 - Dates and times of inspections
 - Who carried out the inspections
 - Bird numbers and species seen
 - Details of any dispersal action taken along with details of any nests/eggs removed.
 - The log must be available to London Gatwick Airfield Operations staff to view upon request.

Review of the Management Plan

The management plan shall be subject to review to reflect changes in habitat or populations of bird species. Should the airport deem it necessary, a meeting between London Gatwick, the applicant and/or Horsham District Council will be convened at the earliest opportunity to discuss and agree any changes which may be necessary.

Inspection & Site Access

London Gatwick or their nominated representatives will be allowed access to the site by prior arrangement, to evaluate the success of the Management Plan and to review any remaining birdstrike hazard.

Long Term Management

This Management Plan will remain enforceable by London Gatwick, Horsham District Council, the CAA or any successor to these bodies throughout the existence of the buildings. These obligations will be passed to any subsequent owners/operators of these buildings and land.
