Please note that following receipt of Natural England's position statement on developments in the Sussex North Water Supply Zone, decisions on planning applications should await the completion of a Sussex North water neutrality strategy unless they can demonstrate water neutrality.



Summary

We have reviewed the documents supplied by the applicant, but unfortunately there is an absence of ecological information included with the application to help assess the potential use of the site by bats. As two agricultural buildings are to be demolished, information on bats is required in accordance with [Government Standing Advice](#).

One European Protected Species Mitigation Licence was granted 1.7km northeast of the site in 2017 for Common Pipistrelle and Soprano Pipistrelle ([MAGIC maps](#)) and there are over 30 records of bats within 2km of the site including Serotine bat, Natterer's bat, Common Pipistrelle, Soprano Pipistrelle, *Myotis* sp. and Brown Long-eared bat (Sussex Biodiversity Record Centre – accessed under licence).

All bat species are designated and protected as European Protected Species, protected under the Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations 2017 (as amended). This means that it is an offence to deliberately kill, injure, disturb or capture bats and to damage or destroy bat breeding sites and resting places (including access points even when bats are not present). It is also an offence under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 to intentionally or recklessly disturb bats while they occupy a structure or place used for shelter or protection or to obstruct their access. This is considered a reasonable request as bats may be present and affected by the development, given that agricultural buildings will be demolished. This request for information is justified, and therefore reasonable, as protected species are a material consideration for planning.

It is therefore reasonable for a suitably qualified ecologist to check for any potential roost features in the buildings to be demolished and prepare a Preliminary Roost Assessment, as well as assessing if any features used by foraging bats will be impacted. This assessment can be undertaken at any time of the year and the results need to be submitted to the LPA together with full details of any further surveys needed to inform the mitigation required to avoid an offence potentially including a licence from Natural England.

We also recommend that the site should be assessed by a suitably qualified ecologist for impacts to protected and Priority species & habitats with identification of proportionate mitigation. A Preliminary Ecological Assessment report should then be submitted to the LPA prior to determination to inform the need for any mitigation and compensation.

To fully assess the impacts of the proposal the LPA needs additional ecological information for the site, particularly for bats, which are European Protected Species, and protected and Priority species & habitats.

The results of these assessments are required prior to determination because paragraph 99 of ODPM Circular 06/2005 highlights that: *"It is essential that the presence or otherwise of protected species, and the extent that they may be affected by the proposed development, is established before the planning permission is granted, otherwise all relevant material considerations may not have been addressed in making the decision."*

This information is required to provide the LPA with certainty of impacts on legally protected species and be able to secure appropriate mitigation either by a mitigation licence from Natural England or a condition of any consent. This will enable the LPA to demonstrate compliance with its statutory duties, including its



biodiversity duty under s40 NERC Act 2006 (as amended) and prevent wildlife crime under s17 Crime and Disorder Act 1998.

We also recommend that reasonable biodiversity enhancements should be identified and implemented to secure net gains for biodiversity, as outlined under Paragraph 180d of the National Planning Policy Framework (December 2023). The reasonable biodiversity enhancement measures should then be outlined within a Biodiversity Enhancement Strategy and should be secured by a condition of any consent.

Please note that we longer provide comments on Biodiversity Net Gain as these are provided by Horsham District Council in-house. Please also note that we have no comments on Great Crested Newt as we have been instructed to leave comments on this European Protected Species to the [NatureSpace Partnership](#).

We look forward to working with the LPA and the applicant to receive the additional information required to overcome our holding objection.
